SPRING 2026 ADVISING AND REGISTRATION



Schedule Builder, Shopping Carts, and your Registration Date are now available in accesSPoint!

All students are **required** to meet with their adviser in order to register for Spring 2026. You will be sent an email from your Academic Adviser that will provide an invite to set up your appointment.

- When signing up for your appointment, make sure you select a day and time PRIOR to your assigned registration day and time.
- To find out when your registration day and time is, log in to accesSPoint, select the "My Classes" tile, then select "Registration Dates", and choose "Spring 2026".

If you are a new student, make sure you have completed the following as applicable:



 Review Pointer's Launch modules 2 and 3 to learn how to prepare for your Spring 2026 advising appointment, and how to register.



 If you earned any credit through AP or IB exams, and you have not done so, send in an office copy of your <u>AP scores</u> or <u>IB scores</u> to the UWSP Admissions Office.



 If you earned any transfer credit, including dual-credit courses in high school, make sure you have sent your official COLLEGE transcript to the UWSP Admissions Office.

REMINDER: MATH PLACEMENT EXAM OPPORTUNITIES

Having a math placement can be critical to completing your degree on time! Be sure you have your math placement score before you meet with your adviser for Spring 2026 advising.
