

Language Matters

Promoting Social Justice

- Using inclusive language can restore dignity to underrepresented groups that have long been ignored
- Can provide representation and affirmation of underrepresented communities

Productive learning environments

- Inclusive language can encourage others to bring more of their "whole selves" to the classroom or workplace
- People will know you are an ally and/or that you are interested in learning



Language Matters

Empowerment

- Using inclusive language has the ability to share power with your students
- Can also encourage your peers to modify their own language to be more inclusive
- Can dismantle negative terminology, stereotypes, or outdated perspectives that may preclude future harm












Stamped from the Beginning

Racist and Antiracist

Antiracist

 One who supports an antiracist policy through their actions or by expression of an antiracist idea

Racist

 One who supports a racist policy through their actions or inaction or by expression of a racist idea

These are **NOT** fixed identities

 We can be racist one moment and antiracist in the next by choosing different actions




Racist and Antiracist

Assimilationist

 One who is expressing the racist idea that a racial group is culturally or behaviorally inferior and is supporting cultural or behavioral enrichment programs to develop that racial group.

Segregationalist

 One who is expressing the racist idea that a permanently inferior racial group can never be developed and is supporting policy that segregates away that racial group.

Pronouns

- Correct use of a friend or classmate's pronouns is an important way of affirming a person's identity
- Trans, Non-binary, Gender nonconforming, and other persons may not always feel comfortable sharing their pronouns initially
- Folks who identify within the gender binary sharing their pronouns may encourage others to do the same



Gender Pronouns

Please note that these are not the only pronouns. There are an infinite number of pronouns as new ones emerge in our language. Always ask someone for their pronouns.

Subjective	Objective	Possessive	Reflexive	Example
She	Her	Hers	Herself	She is speaking. I listened to her. The backpack is hers.
He	Him	His	Himself	He is speaking. I listened to him. The backpack is his.
They	Them	Theirs	Themself	They are speaking. I listened to them. The backpack is theirs.
Ze	Hir/Zir	Hirs/Zirs	Hirself/ Zirself	Ze is speaking. I listened to hir. The backpack is zirs.






Where are you from? No, where are you *REALLY* from?

- Oh, but you speak English so well
- You're not like other Black People
- What do your people think about that?
- I love your hair can I touch it?
- Your name is too hard to pronounce, can I call you _____?
- [In reference to privilege] But I had it hard, too!
- Reverse Racism






Phrases to Reconsider

- "You guys"
- That's savage or He's savage
- You're crazy, that's insane, I'm really OCD about...
- [Blank] is my Spirit Animal
- I was Gyped
- "Mixed" race
- He's a minority
- Articulate (in reference to a POC speaking)



Wait, I'm Confused...

- Black People or African Americans?
- Hispanic or Latino?
- What about Latinx?



- What does BIPOC mean?
- Always remember, we're talking about PEOPLE



Avoid Whitewashing Language

When Africans arrived in America...

Black People were kidnapped and enslaved

African Americans are descendants of slaves

SOME African Americans are descendants of enslaved people

Native Americans were moved to reservations

Native Americans were forcibly removed from their homelands to make room for White settlers

George Floyd's death or the death of Breonna Taylor

The killings of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor

Avoid Deficit Thinking

How can we fix the problems in Black and Brown communities?

What can we do to close the achievement gap between White and Non-White students?

We need to go to the reservations to help the Natives

How do diverse communities view themselves and tell their own stores?

How can I learn more about Black and Brown communities to better understand their values, triumphs, and challenges? How can I support the work is already underway within those communities?

How can we build upon the inherent strength of Communities of Color to help students succeed?

What can I learn from this tribe that will expand my understanding of who they are, their history, and what they believe?

Moving Forward – Personally

- Monitor your assumptions
- Use person-first language
- Be gentle with yourself
 - You're going to mess up and that's OK
 - When you make a mistake, own it, and apologize
- Work to improve, not to be perfect
- This work takes work





Moving Forward – Allyship

Be an ally!

- You don't need to have all the answers to make positive change
- Don't assume things are getting better – check in with those who'd know
- Recognize that you have the power to help restore dignity to people and communities that have been overlooked and looked down upon by mainstream culture for too long
