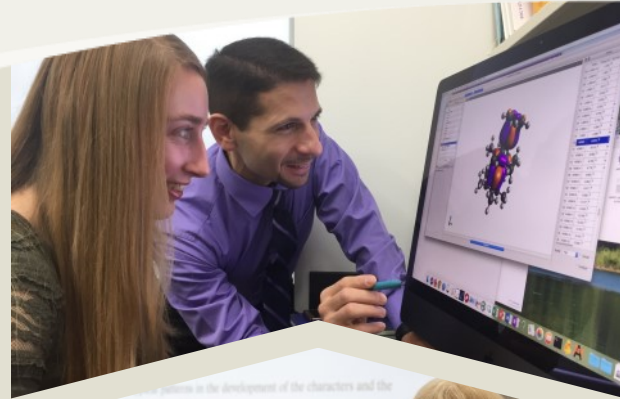

Program Development

During the 2023-2024 year, CITL continued development and/or revision of the Masters of Music Education and associated Graduate Certificates, Doctor of Education Ed.D. in Educational Sustainability, Online Medical Laboratory Technician (AS) to Medical Laboratory Science: Medical Technology (BS) degree completion, and Graduate Certificate in Trauma and Resilience programs.

Starting in Fall 2023, CITL worked with the Department of Biology and the Growth Initiative to develop the new Graduate Certificate in Cannabis Science which will launch in Fall 2025.

Faculty participating in course and program design work with CITL are compensated by the Growth Initiative through either stipends or course releases.

With the creation of the Growth Initiative at UWSP, CITL has transitioned away from our successful Program Grant application process. CITL continues to support all faculty and staff in the areas of pedagogy, instructional design, learning technology, and all other teaching-related areas. Additionally, CITL can offer program development support to units wishing to develop or revise programs that are not part of the Growth Initiative.

Consultations

Consultations with faculty and staff members are really the backbone of what we do in CITL. Our team members offer both one-on-one consultations and group consultations for entire departments or smaller groups of faculty and staff. Team members can provide, training, and assistance in your office, in our office, remotely via Zoom, or during classroom instruction. The CITL team offers consultations on many aspects of teaching and learning:

- inclusive pedagogy
- general teaching pedagogy for all instructional modalities (face-to-face, hybrid, or online)
- instructional design/course design
- teaching with technology
- creating accessible courses
- curriculum design
- organizational development
- other topics as requested

979 scheduled consultations were held with CITL staff.

Exam Scoring

Test scoring services using Remark software are offered as a free service to UWSP instructors. A variety of report styles are available and an email is sent with a secure link to results. The Remark answer sheets are ordered through campus Print and Design and the Remark software produces results that provide easy import into Canvas.

Honorlock

In August 2020, UWSP secured a three-year contract with Honorlock to provide online exam proctoring. Honorlock offers many features that can help prevent cheating on online exams. Individual departments or instructors who teach 100% online courses can choose to use Honorlock. Honorlock is fully funded by the DE service fee for 100% online courses. Instructors or departments electing to use Honorlock for courses that are not fully online must pay for usage from department funds. In line with the Resolution Calling for the Improved Effectiveness and Privacy of Honorlock passed by Student Government Association (SGA) in 2024, all instructors using Honorlock for the first time undergo training with CITL staff to ensure they are aware of best practices in online proctoring.

2,392 exams were proctored using Honorlock during the 2023-2024 academic year.

Pointer Praise

Pointer Praise, a platform to praise the faculty and staff members who rise to challenges and beneficially impact others, was created by CITL. Students, faculty, and staff members are invited to submit uplifting messages that are sent anonymously to a UWSP faculty or staff member.



80 individual submissions were received and sent to deserving faculty and staff members in FY24.

Book Group

Book discussions bring faculty and staff members from across our campuses together to share ideas and thoughts on timely books on a variety of topics of interest. Participants meet virtually during multiple sessions for book discussions facilitated by a CITL team member.

Course Design Short Program

The Course Design Short Program is designed to provide customized one-on-one support to faculty or staff. The program supports instructors in the development or revision of courses in any modality. This program lasts six weeks and is offered three times annually in March-April, June-July, and October-November. The Course Design Short Program is limited to 10 participants during each cycle. Participants who meet all requirements are eligible for \$200 in professional development funds from CITL.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, 14 faculty/instructors completed the Course Design Short Program and seven additional participants are currently completing the program.

\$2,800 in CITL professional development funds were distributed to participants who completed the program during the 2023-2024 academic year.

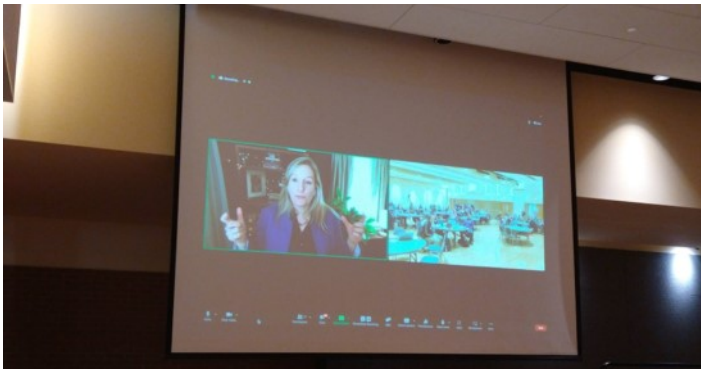

The CITL office, in joint partnership with the Faculty and Staff Gender Sexuality Alliance, provides Safe Zone Training for faculty and staff members.

Many backgrounds and identities have been marginalized, stigmatized, and sometimes targeted with violence and oppression. The training helps participants create Safe Zone spaces to allow people to be their true selves, without fear of such threats.

Teaching Conference

The 28th Annual UWSP Teaching Conference, **Supporting Students and Yourself**, held on Wednesday, January 17, provided a forum for experts from across campus to share how they have been supporting student mental health, connecting students to support services across campus, and helping students develop the skills they need to be successful while also maintaining their own boundaries and protecting their own time and mental health.

Strategic Priorities

Artificial Intelligence

The rapid development and broad availability of generative artificial intelligence tools such as ChatGPT, Co-Pilot, Claude, and others has sparked considerable interest, questions, and concerns from faculty and instructors. CITL has responded by providing a variety of programming and resources to help faculty and instructors learn about generative AI and how it can impact their teaching. To ensure that the work done by our office reflects the needs of the campus community, two CITL staff members served on the AI Policy Working Group convened by Common Council. This group was charged with engaging campus stakeholders to review and develop ethical AI policies and make recommendations for training to the campus. The CITL staff has worked hard to provide resources and training opportunities that align with the recommendations put forth by the AI Policy Working Group and that promote best practices in pedagogy, assessment, and academic integrity.

AI Series

CITL hosted four separate workshops in our Artificial Intelligence Series held in Fall 2023. Although each guest presenter shared a unique viewpoint, they all showcased the challenges presented by generative AI.

These presentations were open to faculty and staff members and 70 participants attended the sessions. More information is available on page 9 of this report, and the recorded workshops are available on the CITL YouTube channel.

AI Policy Working Group Recommendations

A university policy was passed requiring all instructors to include an AI usage policy in their syllabus. CITL has updated our syllabus and Canvas templates to reflect this change and we have included a link to a repository of AI course policies.

The working group also charged CITL to continue to develop and offer faculty/instructor training on the following topics:

- How AI can be used in teaching
- How to AI-proof your assignments
- AI and academic integrity

In response to this charge, CITL has engaged in the following work:

- Developing website resources, to be launched in Fall 2024, that address generative AI policies, and generative AI and your assignments—both include steps faculty can take to promote academic integrity
- Book Groups on *Teaching With AI* for the 2024-25 academic year
- We licensed the course, "Teaching with AI" through Auburn University
 - ◇ All CITL instructional designers have completed the course
 - ◇ Jan. – June: 19 UWSP instructors registered for the course, with another 10 requesting to start in July or August
- Two summer assignment re-design workshops were held with more planned for the fall semester
- Creating an interactive training on academic integrity for faculty for Fall 2024



Strategic Priorities

Student Support

Student Mental Health

Student mental health remains the focus of much attention for UWSP faculty and instructors. Over the last year, CITL has provided programming and resources to help equip our faculty with the tools they need to thrive in this area. We hosted two Faculty/Staff Book Groups on the book *Mind Over Monsters: Supporting Youth Mental Health Through Compassionate Challenge*. The theme for the 28th Annual UWSP Teaching Conference was “Supporting Students and Yourself,” and featured a keynote address by *Mind Over Monsters* author Dr. Sarah Rose Cavanagh. During the conference faculty and staff shared how they have been supporting student mental health, connecting students to support services, and helping students to develop the skills they need to be successful while also maintaining boundaries and protecting their own time and mental health. CITL continues to work to make connecting students to support services easier by providing a revised Student Support Resource module in Canvas that draws explicit attention to student mental health resources. Faculty Fellow Sallie Scovill is working with partners across campus to develop a training course for UWSP faculty and instructors on supporting student mental health.

Student Success

This year, CITL has provided professional development and support for faculty and instructors to help students more successfully transition to college. We hosted a fall Book Group on *Teach Students How to Learn* which provides faculty and instructors with concrete tips on how to help students build the study skills they need to be successful learners in college. And, we welcomed the author, Dr. Saundra McGuire, for a virtual event in November.

CITL team members have also worked to make it easier for faculty and instructors to connect students with the support resources they need. We’ve revised our Student Support Resource module in Canvas and added a link so faculty can access Navigate within Canvas. CITL team member Eric Simkins currently serves on the Navigate leadership team to provide input, create training materials, and enhance communication around how instructors can use Navigate to issue alerts and connect students with support resources.
