This year, the Center for Inclusive Teaching and Learning made meaningful strides toward achieving the goals and outcomes we outlined last year. From expanding web-based resources to increasing the number of faculty development programs we offer, our work has been guided by a clear vision: to work with UWSP educators to create a campus community committed to student learning within a culture of inclusivity and diversity.

We enhanced our web-based resources, increased the number and learning communities we offer, and aligned our offerings more closely with UWSP's strategic priorities.

Through book clubs, consultations, communities of practice, and our annual teaching conference, we supported instructors across all three campuses in their efforts to create more equitable, engaging, and student-centered learning environments. These efforts go beyond programming – they are about building relationships, sharing ideas, and cultivating a community of scholarly teachers at UWSP.

Mission Statement

The Center for Inclusive Teaching and Learning’s (CITL’s) mission is to cultivate a vibrant campus community committed to student learning within a culture of inclusivity and diversity.

Core Services

CITL’s core services bring University College’s core values of **collaborating**, **supporting**, **connecting**, and **engaging** to life in our daily work.

HOLISTIC TEACHING SUPPORT

CITL provides **support** to faculty and instructors covering all aspects of teaching and learning. CITL programming offers opportunities to **collaborate** and **engage** with others across disciplines and campuses. Our support begins with New Instructor Orientation, where we provide the *New Faculty and Instructor Guide to Teaching and Learning*. The support continues with workshop opportunities, Faculty Learning Communities, the Annual Teaching Conference, and weekly Teaching Tip videos.

COURSE AND PROGRAM DESIGN SUPPORT

CITL course and program design provides solid **support** to faculty and instructors as they create course materials. CITL’s design support programming produces opportunities for **engagement** and **connection** with colleagues. We are with UWSP instructors every step of the way in the design process and provide grant funds for participation in our Course Design Shorts program.

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT

CITL **support** to faculty and instructors on instructional technology aids them in **engaging** and **connecting** with students. Our team delivers campus support for Canvas and Honorlock, as well as training and guidance using artificial intelligence tools, videos, and other technologies. Bubble sheet test scoring service is also offered to faculty and instructors on all UWSP campuses.

Strategic Priorities

High-Impact Practices

Both UWSP and the Universities of Wisconsin have the expansion and prioritization of High-Impact Practices (HIPs) in their strategic plans. In support of this initiative, CITL developed a [webpage featuring information and resources on HIPs](#). Additionally, CITL secured \$20,000 in funding from the Universities of Wisconsin to support faculty and instructors in implementing these practices. This year, CITL facilitated two communities of practice on HIPs – one led by Dona Warren and the other by Erin Speetzen. Sixteen instructors participated, designing or revising course activities to align with the recognized markers of quality for high-impact practices. These enhanced learning experiences are expected to impact nearly 500 students each year.

Scholarship of Teaching and Learning

UWSP continues to champion the use of evidence-based practices, innovative technologies, and equity-minded pedagogies in teaching and learning. In alignment with this goal, CITL has been working to build institutional capacity to more formally support the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning (SoTL). Guided by the SoTL Scaffold Model (Cruz, et. al, 2019) we focused this year on raising awareness, sparking curiosity, and laying the foundation for sustained SoTL engagement.

To highlight the excellent SoTL work already happening on our campus, we featured a series of SoTL spotlights in the CITL newsletter and launched a [dedicated SoTL webpage](#) with resources for those interested in exploring SoTL further. We are thrilled to announce that James Berry, Associate Professor of English, will serve as a CITL Faculty Fellow next year. He will run our first year-long SoTL Learning Community, where seven participants will engage in individual SoTL projects throughout the academic year.

In addition, we have begun conversations with established SoTL scholars at UWSP to explore how we can better support ongoing work and foster a community of SoTL scholars across campus.

Open Educational Resources

The Universities of Wisconsin has established an Open Educational Resources (OER) Community of Practice to support and expand the use of OER across the system. This group – comprised of representatives from libraries and teaching centers across the state – provides guidance and resources to help faculty and instructors integrate OER into their courses. Both the UWSP Library and CITL have representatives on this group.

At UWSP, CITL and the University Library have been working together to build campus infrastructure that supports OER adoption. In addition to launching a [dedicated OER webpage](#), we secured funding from the text rental fee to encourage the adoption, adaptation, and creation of OER by UWSP faculty. We've also begun developing support materials and have recruited faculty participants for a summer pilot program to advance this work.

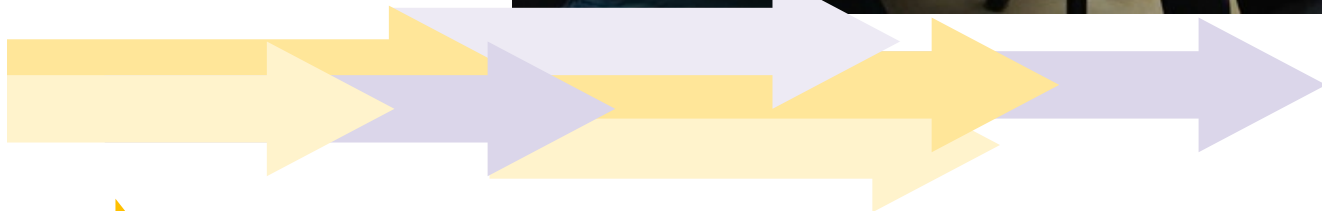
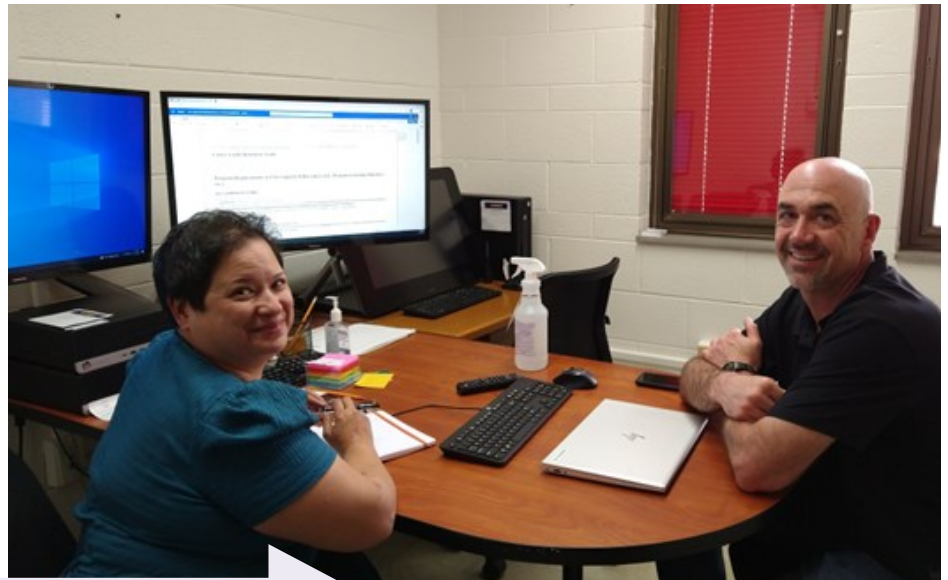


Align course components to promote the achievement of learning outcomes

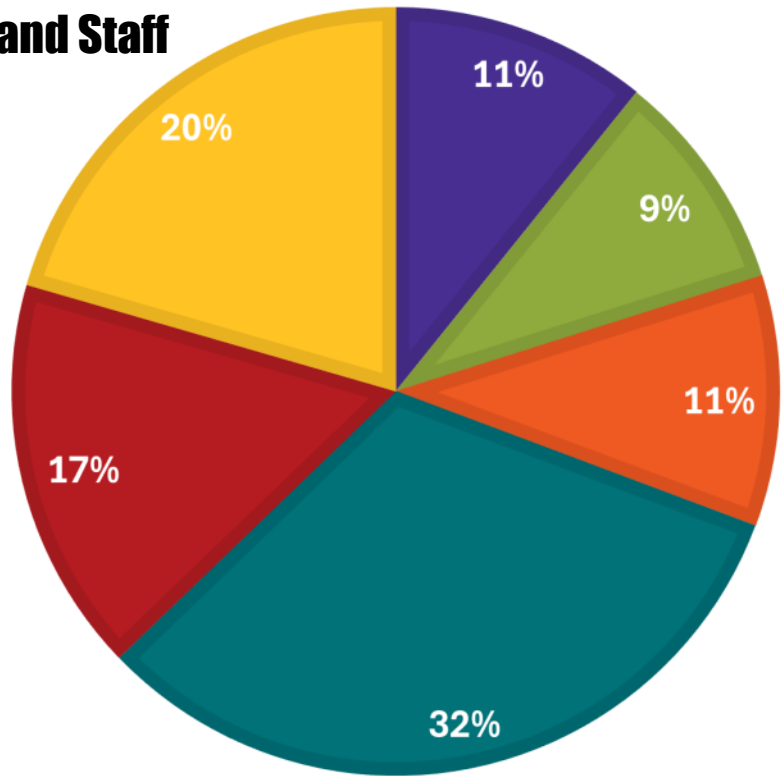
