
AIS Coordinator Position

- AIS position is important in Washington/Waukesha Counties and SE WI because of proximity to Lake Michigan
- Many lakes
- Many boaters
- However, partnerships are not only important here...



AIS Coordinator Partnerships


- Forming strong partnerships between organizations is important all over the state for a multitude of different reasons!
- Many different jobs that protect WI natural resources are fantastic but are not far-reaching
- Strong partnerships allow a position to be extended to benefit different organizations that can help each other simultaneously achieve multiple goals
- Especially important in grant-funded and government positions... Not much \$\$ available, but a lot of work to be done!



Importance of Partnerships

- Allow us do more with less
 - E.g. Snapshot day volunteers in Washington County, AIS Coordinator position
- Extend the arms of project coordinators beyond their "boundaries" without having to cross borders
 - Grant borders, watershed boundaries
- Allows project coordinator to reach beyond one project and successfully implement multiple projects simultaneously
 - E.g. 4-H Purple Loosestrife Beetle Program, CBCW by different Lake Groups, Monitoring/Surveys, Rapid Response, Cleaning Stations





Importance of Partnerships

- The flow of important issues to and from Board of Directors or County Board to residents and back.
- The residents are shown that the County Board thinks the program is important and the County Board is shown that the residents are involved in the issue
 - E.g. Lake Groups donating money to the Aquatic Invasive Species Program Grant.

Choosing Great Partners

- No, not that kind of partner! Do NOT play "in your eyes" by Peter Gabriel
- Partners should be professional contacts that you can trust to do a great job and that you can help from your end
- Choose partners you can work well with. Or learn how to.







Three Kinds of Partners

- 1) Professional partners through grants or organizations
 - DNR, County, Universities, Scientists, Specialists
 - Cannot always get match, but can form strong partnership
 - Either award grants or provide "professional match" for services



Three Kinds of Partners

- 2) Local partners through organizations
 - E.g. Fire Department, 4-H, FFA, CBCW, CLMN
 - Give them Certificates or Proof of Work!
 - Usually provide volunteer or professional match for services



Three Kinds of Partners

- 3) Volunteers individual partners
 - Person off the street
 - People who call with individual issues
 - See something wrong and want to do the right thing
 - Looking to volunteer
 - Volunteer labor match and donated equipment match



Getting Local Buy-In

- Make yourself and your position known!
 - Contact local newspaper with issues
 - Local media when issues arise**
 - Utilize social media like Facebook, Twitter, and Constant Contact newsletters
- Face to Face is most important! People like to see you doing work: stop and talk to them!







Build a Strategic Plan


- Follows County Land and Water Plan
- Brings different ideas from the community together to the drawing table

Once You Have a Strong Partner Base and Plan. . . 1) People who seek out work themselves

- This work requires training
 - Give them a positive learning experience
 - End the training with certification/certificates
 - Provide adequate materials
- They want to get out and start doing the work! Be short, sweet and to the point.
- CBCW, CLMN, Purple Loosestrife, Shore Land Restoration, Interns, Boat Launch Security







Once You Have a Strong Partner Base...

2) People who need to know about the work to do it themselves

- Waterfowl Hunters
- Boaters
- Anglers
- Lakeshore property owners
- Gardeners
- Pet Stores
- Bait Dealers



The people who like seek out work themselves will provide outreach and education to this group.



Once You Have a Strong Partner Base... 3) People Who Pay Cash and Write Grants

- Lake Districts
- Lake Associations
- State/Local Resources



- Send Lake Groups prewritten letters simply explaining what you need from them to make your grant work
- Give them a suggested donation price. If you leave it up to them, they will decide on \$0
- Combination of Grants
 with documented
 commitment of Donated
 Cash and Donated Labor
 is the best way to fund a
 position while garnering
 new partnerships in your
 community!

Letter of Recommendation and In-Kind Match for Washington County Planning and Parks AIS Proposa

Dear Committee Members:

Controlling aquatic invasive species is a major concern of the property owners and surrounding community on _Like___Our lake is a very popular fishing and recreational lake and draws boaters from many surrounding execut. It is our belief that boaters travelling from one lake to another are the main cause for the spread of invasive species, and that educating boaters is the number one tool to prevent the spread of invasive species, and that educating boaters in the number one tool to prevent the preventing NR40 Prohibited and Restricted species from including pondeved, and starry stonework. Preventing NR40 Prohibited and Restricted species from including whiching between lakes is of the utmost importance to protect the waters within our County, and our State. Working with the Wanningon County AS Coordinator who will focus on education, prevention, and planning is an important step to take to help assure future water quality, and prevent the spread of invasive species.

We are willing, as __Lake Group___ to provide any help or resources as in-Aind match to the AIS Grant so long as it sids in the prevention of spreading AIS. Examples include motored and non-motored boats to be counted as match at the market rate or donated volunteer hours from our __Lake Group___ members. We have in fact prevoking been providing these resources in the past for various surveys, Clean Boats Chen Waters, and Oilsen Lakes Monitoring Nations's.

The __lake Group __enthusiatrically supports this grant application in an effort to better control aquatic invasive species in our County lakes. We hope you will support our effort and recommand that you fully support their proposal.
