

Defining the Problem

- Seek out expert resources to help you validate what you suspect
 - WI DNR Website
 - WI DNR staff
 - Consultants
 - Vendors
- Reach out to others who have "been there"
 - Contact other lake groups
 - Network at conventions
- Do your homework and get educated

- Create a written statement that provides a compelling "call to action"
 - What is expert consensus on required actions
 - What is the price of inaction
- Identify a Local Team
 - Individuals with common interests
 - Who has a history of getting things done
 - Who are the people other local organizations depend upon
- Create a formal organizational structure
 - Define roles
 - Develop bi-laws and operational guidelines



Motivating the Masses

- Key initial funding, filling out your team, getting the word out and moral support
- Identify key shareholders
 - Property owners
 - Businesses
 - Other organizations, clubs or associations
 - Local political entities
- Hold a stakeholder meeting
 - Intriguing invites
 - Formal agenda
 - Scripted presentation
 - Educate them on the problem and cost of inaction
 - Sign up members, get annual fee and donations
- Keep everybody informed





Building a Plan



- Use team resources
- Hire a consultant on spec
 - Fees can often be covered in part by a state grant
- Critical to scientifically validating your requirements, actions and outcomes
- Planned deliverables make it much easier to get things done and hold people accountable
- A must have for securing help with funding



Long Term Funding



- Fundraising
- Membership fees & donations
- Angel donors
- State and local grants







- Make sure you have a formal plan
- Engage stakeholders in the process
- Make sure to engage with and leverage the expertise of your area DNR resource team
 - Key part of your team, vested in your success from planning through permitting, treatment/harvesting and outcomes measurement
- Constant communication and education
- OK...there's this guy!







- Invasive species control efforts are typically not one time events. Strategy, planning and implementation have to be thought of more on a generational basis
- Based upon outcomes, update the plan with support of your DNR contacts and other expert resources
- Continually engage your membership
 - Report on successes
 - Don't ever stop recruiting
