	In this workshop educators will learn how solar panels work, explore a KEEP lesson that uses the Solar Tilt Kit to generate electricity, and discuss the importance of installed renewable energy as an important climate change solution that school districts can use to support student learning. Lunch and Keynote Noon <u>Student & Teacher Autonomy Meet School Forest & King of the Game Birds</u> Paula Zwicke, Superior Education Solutions and Consulting It all started with a single question to two high schoolers in a project-based learning school-What do you know about Ruffed Grouse and the school forest? Through the next half dozen years of a multi-phased Ruffed Grouse and American Woodcock Habitat Research Project, one school and a student team would be awarded the Wisconsin School Forest Award, present their research at conferences around the State, and change the way school looked for the next decade. In the end, they influenced how their district managed school forest property and impacted an entire animal species and human community. From Seed to Sapling and Beyond: Real Student Projects in the School Forest 1pm Paula Zwicke, Superior Education Solutions and Consulting This workshop is for educators interested in using the school forest for inquiry-based learning to affect real impact on students, the school forest, and the global community. Regardless of your experience level with school forests and outdoor learning, plan to learn how to take the seed of any idea or question and turn it into action steps that, through student voice and agency, engages learners in cross-curricular content, community, and citizenship. Be prepared to learn how to immerse students in authentic experiences in the school forest and leave with an understanding of the immense resource that is out the back door of, or down the road from, the school building. 2pm What's new in the world of research? Dr. Kendra Liddicoat, Associate Professor of EE, UWSP Dr. Becca Franzen, Associate Professor of EE, UWSP Research can help you improve and justify your programs. Come review recent EE research, discuss applications to your EE site, and make plans to collect your own data. We will begin by sharing a synopsis of recently published research related to EE. Then participants will have a chance to discuss how the findings of these studies could be used to improve and justify their own programs. Lastly, we will share some resources and suggestions in support of doing quality research and evaluation at EE settings in the Midwest. Participants will gain a familiarity with recent research and develop ideas for contributing to such efforts.
