Dear Dad,

I answered your "letter" once but I received it back again because of lack of postage, so I decided to rewrite it.

In the first place dad I am all for it, and I agree with you in every thing you said. I to feel that the west coast is the place for us, especially the north west. Every since I was on the officed board I had felt the friction that some of the members had tried to cause you and then ~~left~~ while I was working at waymines I felt it there also. Mr Wayne use to tell me about some of the men coming in and trying to get him to agree on certain things, but he would laugh at them usually isome in a while he would become disgusted with them. He once told me that if you went there he would probably go to one of the other churches.

I would rather go to school some where on the west cont, I think Bob would too.

Other wise I am all for the move dad. In case the move does come up I want you to take the

money I have in my account and use it on
the move. It would do a lot more good in that
than anything I could do with it.

There ~~also~~ has been something else
that I have wanted to talk over with you
for the last couple weeks, it concerns the duty
which I will probably get out of the school here.
as far as we know most of our class will get
duty out side of the U.S. Most of the stations
in the alutians and the North atlantic chain
have been replaced with new men from the
last class so we will not go there. otherwise
we will most likely go into the pacific
some where, on a new type of unit. this type
of unit forms in Maryland where we get more
experience with the gear then we will probably
go south into Florida and practice under conditions
similar to those we should encounter when we get
out. this is all secret gear so not much can
be told about it. I can say tho if we do go out
on one of these units our gear will be mobile. By
that I mean it is mounted in large trucks
and we go into a area stay as long as necessary
then move on. As I say tho nothing is
for sure as yet ss things may change. Even if
I did go on a mobile unit I wouldn't leave the

states for probably 6 or 8 weeks if that soon.
This war is great dad - it makes me proud to
think that someone in the U.S. was smart
enough to invent it. It gives anyone attached
to it a chance to serve in a good way. As I
say tho nothing is definite so I don't think
there should be much said about it. You are
the only one who knows about it and until
some thing definite does come up I shall keep quiet
about it.

I am glad you confided in me on the
move matter, anything you do dad I will always
back it up 100%. Any interests interests that
I might have in C.S. is certainly nothing to stop me from
being in favor of the move. For I have gotten to
realize that distance does not separate people really.
Some times in mat cases it makes them more oppre-
ssive of each other. It certainly ^{was} made me proud of
Janice when I was home. While I have been in I have
seen so many the girls who are cheap and degrading, then
when I was home I realized how good and fine
she was. I imagine there are a lot of girl like that
still, some times tho I lose faith in some some of
the women I see. It has been wonderful to write
to her and receive letters from her. We have made
quite a few plans - but right now we who are both
young and the war won't last to long.

I must stop now dad it has been great to talk
with you - I shall write again soon - Your son
