Survey Terms and Definitions

<u>Climate</u>: Current attitudes, behaviors, and standards of employees and students concerning the access for, inclusion of, and level of respect for individual and group needs, abilities, and potential.

<u>Disability</u>: A person who has a physical or mental impairment which substantially limits one or more major life activities, has a record of such impairment, or is regarded as having such impairment

Ethnic Identity: A unique social and cultural heritage shared by a group of people.

<u>Gender Identity</u>: A person's inner sense of being male, female, both, or neither. The internal identity may or may not be expressed outwardly, and may or may not correspond to one's physical characteristics.

<u>Gender Expression</u>: The manner in which a person outwardly represents their gender, regardless of the physical characteristics that might typically define them as male or female.

<u>Institutional Status</u>: Within the institution, the status one holds by virtue of their position/status within the institution (e.g., staff, full-time faculty, part-time faculty, administrator, etc.)

<u>American Indian (Native American)</u>: A person having origin in any of the original tribes of North America who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

Non-Native English Speakers: People for whom English is not their first language.

<u>Physical Characteristics</u>: Term that refers to one's appearance.

<u>Racial Identity</u>: A socially constructed category about a group of people based on generalized physical features such as skin color, shape of eyes, physique, etc.

<u>Sexual Assault</u>: Intentional physical contact, such as sexual intercourse or touching, of a person's intimate body parts by someone who did not have permission to make such contact.

<u>Sexual Harassment</u>: A repeated course of conduct whereby one person engages in verbal or physical behavior of a sexual nature, that is unwelcome, serves no legitimate purpose, intimidates another person, and has the effect of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive work or classroom environment.

<u>Sexual Orientation</u>: Term that refers to the sex of the people one tends to be emotionally, physically and sexually attracted to; this is inclusive of, but not limited to, lesbians, gay men, bisexual people, heterosexual people, and those who identify as queer.

<u>Socioeconomic Status</u>: The status one holds in society based on one's level of income, wealth, education, and familial background.

<u>Social Support</u>: The resources other people provide, including a person's perception that he or she can rely on other people for help with problems or intimes of crisis. Having feelings of connectedness and being a part of a community.

<u>Transgender</u>: Umbrella term for someone whose self-identity challenges traditional societal definitions of male and female.
