Course Description

This course covers the formal and informal processes involved in environmental policymaking. We will study how different parts of the U.S. public view environmental problems, how political actors influence the policy process, and how the era of legislative 'gridlock' has impacted environmental policymaking. The course concludes with an in-depth case study of a single area of environmental policymaking.

- describe features of environmental problems that generate political disagreements
- explain how political actors influence and are influenced by environmental policy.
- interpret measurements of environmental policy effectiveness.
