Course Outcomes:

1. Students will become familiar with the state requirements and administrative procedures for conducting hunter education classes.
2. Students will become familiar with teaching methods for conducting hunter education classes.
3. Students will learn about the history of and issues facing the hunter education program.
4. Students will have an opportunity to teach in a hunter education class.

Course Requirements and Grading Policy:

1. Students are required to attend each class. One excused absence is allowed. The student may be required to make up the class by attending a class with another hunter education team in the area. If the student misses more than one class period, the instructor will have the option of withholding credit for the course.
2. Students will often team teach. Each team will be responsible for conducting class part of one evening of the actual hunter education course. The teaching of each student will be evaluated by Diane Lueck, Peggy Farrell, and by the other NR 210 students.
3. Each team will be required to write a lesson plan for one segment it teaches.
4. Students are expected to participate cheerfully and professionally in each class session. They are expected to maintain a professional attitude and appearance at all times.

5. An Instructor Pre-certification exam is required by DNR. This is an open book, group work exam.

Any student who scores below 750 points will not be certified as an instructor even if he or she receives a passing grade in the course.

Notice that professionalism is 50% of your grade. Included in professionalism are the following:

1. Appearance. Apprentice instructors will be clean and well-groomed. Hair, beards, and clothing must look as well taken care of, as this class requires a high level of public interaction.

2. Attire. You may wear jeans in good condition. No holes, no stains, not too tight. You should wear sport shirts or sweaters. Only t-shirts of the highest level of repair and taste are acceptable. No foul language, no graphics of a sexual or other questionable nature, and no advertising for beer, liquor or anything else that may be found to be offensive by your audience. Sweats are not acceptable professional attire.

3. Language. No foul language. No dirty jokes. No off-color remarks. Remember that some of your students may not actually be interested in hunting. Be sensitive to how you phrase things.
