Welcome to **Elementary Arab I** (4 cr.)

Global Perspective, Communication Skills

Introduction to Modern Standard Arabic will acquaint students with the working vocabulary, dialogue skills, and pronunciation needed for elementary Arabic reading and writing. Linguistic development will include basic listening skills, elementary conversation, appreciation of the many Arabic dialects, and knowledge of Arab culture.

Prerequisites- None

GE/RES/GLP attributes (General Education)- Both the globalization of work and the career education that is part of UW-Stout's mission make it desirable that students appreciate cultural, economic, political, environmental and social differences. Learning a second language at the college level and developing an understanding of another culture provides students with skills they will use in international situations. To earn a bachelor's degree, students who started Fall 2010 or later must fulfill a global perspective requirement by:

- Completing a program of university-approved work or study abroad, or
- Completing six credits of courses approved as fulfilling the global perspective requirement. ARAB 101 will count towards meeting four of the six credits needed to satisfy the Global Perspective Requirement.

Course Learning Objectives-

By the end of this course you are expected to be able to do the following:

- 1. **Understand** some formal and informal Arabic speech, letters, words, and sounds.
- 2. **Communicate** at a level appropriate for dialogue with Arabic native-speakers in simple everyday life contexts.
- 3. **Possess** the ability to skim and scan short texts.
- 4. Master skills necessary to write short paragraphs or dialogues on familiar topics.
- 5. **Develop** a good grasp of some elementary concepts of Arabic grammar.
- 6. **Acquire** basic knowledge of and appreciation of Arab culture.

- 7. **Understand** the differences in the many Arabic dialects and how to decipher the codes.
- 8. **Demonstrate** a basic level of competence in Arabic literacy

Course Outline-

- Introduction, discussion of course objectives, and syllabus. Address study skills and time management. Plan to spend 8 to 10 hours a week studying Arabic.
- Practice basic letters and sounds. (Objective 1)
- Learn the Arabic alphabet. (Objectives 1,8)
- Practice writing and connecting the letters along with oral/written drills (Objective 1)
- Produce the sounds out of which Arabic words are made. (Objectives 1, 2)
- Begin orally communicating elementary ideas in the language (Objective 1)
- Gradually decipher the codes of the Arabic language. (Objectives 3, 7)
- Read and write simple sentences.(Objectives 3, 4, 5)
- Practice reading phrases and writing sentences on basic pictures. (Objectives 1, 2)
- Discuss Arab culture (Objective 6) (GLP Global Self Awareness 1.C and Global Knowledge 2.A and 2.D)
- Review the many Arabic dialects and identify what makes them different (Objective 7)
 (GLP Global Self Awareness 1.C and Global Engagement 2.A)

Practice both conversation and written exercises daily. (Objective 2)

Study the cultural and literary knowledge of Arabic culture so one can function in the Arabic-speaking communities around the world.(Objective 8) (GLP Global Knowledge 2.A, 2.B, and 2.D; GLP Global Engagement 4.A and 4.D.)

Evaluation- Students will be evaluated on class preparation, participation, attendance, homework, quizzes, mid-term and final exams.
