**Textbook:** *Biology of Women*, 6<sup>th</sup> edition, written by Theresa Hornstein and Jeri Schwerin (Kendall Hunt, ©2020). This required book will serve as the source for much of the information in the course, and it is available for free rental at the university bookstore. Additional readings which offer more information and additional perspectives will also be provided.

#### **Course Catalog Description**

An introduction to the physiology and reproductive anatomy of women including pregnancy, human development, cancer, infertility, birth control, sexually transmitted diseases and other health issues. Class Attributes: Natural World (AD)

### **Course Rationale And Learning Objectives**

This course is designed for any student who desires the following:

- 1) To become knowledgeable about current women's health issues and how such issues are influenced by culture and other social factors
- 2) To understand women's anatomy and physiology
- 3) To evaluate current research on the biology of women
- 4) To become familiar with the vocabulary used in biology, particularly the biology of
- 5) To understand how experiments are designed to answer specific scientific questions
- 6) To communicate scientific information (orally and in writing) in a clear and concise manner
- 7) To evaluate the connection between social issues and women's health issues
- 8) To have opportunities to discuss global concerns about the wellbeing of women

### **Course Expectations**

Students are expected to be present at all class meetings. Some discussion-based assignments will be done in class during many class periods. So, unexcused class absences may negatively affect a student's course grade. Prior to missing any class session, please discuss with your instructor the reason for any absences which you feel should be excused, so that you can be given the opportunity to make up any in-class work that you will miss. Students should not use ear buds or cell phones in class unless they have spoken with the instructor about this first. The instructor and students are expected to show respect for everyone in the class. Textbook reading assignments

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and other reading assignments should be completed before the designated class meeting time. Students are encouraged to discuss assignments with each other unless indicated otherwise. However, students may not copy answers from each other, and each person's answers must be in his or her own words. The policies found in chapter UWS 14 of the Wisconsin Administrative code will be used in the case of suspected academic misconduct. Examinations are in-person and should be completed independently without using any books or notes. For effective communication, you should type and spell-check your work on all assignments unless notified otherwise. Students should daily check their student email account and Canvas as some class announcements and some handouts and some reading assignments will be distributed using these technologies. Scores on assignments and examinations will be posted on Canvas, and an estimation of your course grade will be kept updated during the semester on Canvas.

### **Evaluation of Student Work (Grading)**

1) **Examinations (300 points)** There are three exams scheduled during class. In addition, there will be a cumulative final exam (scheduled for Friday, December 16 at 2:45PM). All four exams will be in-person, closed-book and closed-notes. Point values on each of the exams are as follows:

- 2) **Problem Sets and Discussion Assignments (240 points)** Problem sets and discussion assignments will be given, collected, and graded throughout the semester for a total of 240 points. Many of these assignments will be done in class.
- 3) Current Topic Presentation and Report (60 points) Each student will prepare a short, oral PowerPoint presentation on a current issue related to the biology of women. Students may choose the topics, but approval must be obtained from the instructor. A written report must accompany the presentation. In preparation for this assignment, students will be given a list of grading criteria. The oral presentation together with the written report will be given a score from zero to sixty points. All students should submit their PowerPoint presentation slides to the instructor by December 11, so that the instructor has adequate time to review the slides before the oral presentations. Students should be prepared to give presentations in class on December 13 or December 15 as assigned. Up to fifteen points will be deducted from a student's score if he/she is not present virtually to listen to all the presentations by other students on December 13 and December 15, unless the student has received permission from the instructor to be absent.
- 3) **Letter Grades** There are a total of 600 possible points available in this course. The percentage of the total points a student earns will be converted to letter grades using the following table:
