#### **Course format:**

**For each chapter**, materials will consist of 1) PowerPoint Slides, 2) Homework Problems, 3) Optional Smart Book Reviews. At the end of every 3-4 chapters, there will be an exam.

**PowerPoint Slides:** PowerPoint slides used in class will be available in Canvas prior to each class period. Students are encouraged to refer to these slides and take notes during class time.

**Homework:** Online problems (found on McGraw-Hill *Connect*) will be assigned for select chapters and will be posted at the beginning of each chapter under the Assignments tab in Canvas. **Students can access Connect through Canvas.** Problems are assigned to help students better understand course material. As such, problems are designed to be done after the chapter has been discussed in class. Students have three attempts to complete each homework assignment. **The highest attempted score (not the last score) will be recorded in the gradebook.** Additionally, the two lowest homework scores will be dropped from the final homework average. As such, no late homework will be accepted. We will discuss some of the homework problems during class.


**Smart Book Reviews (recommended):** Will be available on McGraw-Hill Connect for each chapter studied. The reviews may be completed for unlimited practice but will not count toward the final grade.

**Exams:** Each of the four exams will consist of problems and/or multiple-choice questions. Exams will be based on lectures, assigned readings, quizzes, and assignments. They will be taken in class on Connect.

## 5. COURSEWORK DESCRIPTIONS & COMMENTARY

### 5.1. Exams

- There will be a total of 4 exams during the course of the semester, each worth 18%. Exams will be taken in class on McGraw-Hill Connect. Students will be able to use a calculator and an equation sheet for the exams.

### 5.2. Smart Book

- *Smart Book* review on McGraw-Hill *Connect* (recommended) may be completed for unlimited practice but will not count toward the final grade.

### 5.3. Assignments

- Homework assignments for select chapters will be completed for a grade on the McGraw-Hill Connect website. Normally, three homework assignments per exam will be assigned. In total, these assignments are worth 20% of the final class grade. The lowest two assignments will be dropped. Students may be asked to present select problems from the homework to the class.

For this course and to help your future career, you must attend **two** official Pro Events. Some assignments require account creation for online programs. The instructor of this course will not share your academic records (grades, student IDs).
