## Course Description

Chinese 101 is the beginning level language course. It does not require prior knowledge of the Chinese language. The course will focus on all four language skills: reading, writing, listening and speaking. It will also introduce students to the various cultural aspects of China. These two semesters course will provide students with a solid foundation in Chinese grammar and vocabulary, which is a necessary preparation for continued study of the Chinese language. Oral expression using the Chinese language will be an important aspect of this course

## Course Objective

CHINESE 101 is an introduction to the Chinese language and Chinese characters. By the end of the semester, with reasonable effort, students will be able to handle routine situations of a concrete personal and social nature. In this course you will develop the following skills:

- Developing effective Chinese language pronunciations (han yu pin yin)
- Beginning to write Chinese characters
- Meeting and greeting people, and understanding class instructions
- Talking about family, friends and hobbies
- Telling time, dates and days of the week
- Describing school activities
- Talking about the weather
- Writing accurate short passages on familiar and personal topics.

## Course Requirements

- 1) In order to succeed in this course, regular attendance and active participation in class are extremely important. In accordance with Departmental policy, unexcused absences will be noted and three or more will cause a reduction in points on the final exam. In addition, assignments or quizzes missed due to an unexcused absence cannot be made up.
- 2) **Home work and assignments:** Most of the work for this class will be completed outside of the classroom. Other compositions and exercises assigned by the instructor are to be done independently outside of class in order to make the best use of group time during the class hours. Homework must be done on time.
- 3) **Quizzes** will be given every Thursday to ensure that students have understood and grasped new material and know the characters we have learned. Make- up quizzes are not permitted.
- 4) **Tests and Exams:** There will be a test after each chapter, a mid-term oral exam and a final comprehensive exam which will include oral exams.

- Install the Chinese language bar on your own computer.

**Lab policy & Oral work:** Students must spend at least two hours per week on lab work.
