Course Description

This course examines the gross anatomy and physiology of the speech mechanism, specifically the respiratory, phonatory, and articulatory sub-systems. In addition, the central nervous system will be introduced and discussed as it relates to speech and language.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the respiratory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 2. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the phonatory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 3. Each student will understand and explain the anatomy and physiology of the articulatory system and how this system relates to communication.
- 4. Each student will recall information about the nervous system as it relates to speech and language.
