COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a general introduction to the study of language. It includes an overview of basic concepts and methods of language study and introduces some of the core areas of linguistics research: phonetics and phonology (the sound system), morphology (the structure of words), syntax (the structure of phrases and sentences), semantics (how words relate to meaning), and language acquisition.

By learning how language works, students will better understand the interrelatedness of language, its innateness, and its social setting. Students will also gain a better understanding of the form and function of language and will develop an adequate perspective on commonly held prejudices and misconceptions about language.

You will be assigned readings that are to be completed before class. If I am concerned that students are not reading, I reserve the right to give reading quizzes, which will be graded.

Attendance and participation:

Because so much of your learning will take place in class, you must attend on a regular basis. I will take attendance every class period. For this class, "attendance" means being present, on time, and prepared for the entire class period. A student who is chronically late to class, leaves early, or is not prepared to participate in the day's classwork will not receive attendance and participation credit.

You will have three (3) "freebie absences" for the semester, excluding the final exam period. Use them carefully. If you miss more than three scheduled classes, each missed class will result in the loss of **one grade** (e.g. from A– to B+) from your Attendance total (see Grading below).

Should you arrive for class after I have taken attendance (usually 5 minutes or more after class has begun), it is your responsibility to find the sheet, sign it, and mark yourself as "late". Three "lates" will count as one absence.

Because attendance is such a crucial part of your grade, it is very important to let me know if anything happens that would prevent you from coming to class.
