COURSE DESCRIPTION

The UWSP Catalog gives the following description of this course:

Overview of history and structure of English and conventions of standard written English. Includes contemporary approaches to teaching grammar, usage, punctuation.

As the description states, in this class we will examine the conventions of the English language, focusing on the variety known as "standard written English." Although we will focus on the variety that is associated with the classroom, we will also discuss other varieties and the ways in which language use is negotiated by teacher and student.



By addressing these concerns, you should be provided with some tools useful for teaching English language arts.


COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

ASSIGNMENTS AND ASSESSMENT

Over the course of the semester, there will be three exams (one of which will be given during finals week), and four homework assignments. Attendance and participation (by way of discussions and practice work) will also play a role in your grade.

Exams

The three exams for this class will be given in class and will be equally weighted. The third exam will be given during finals week.

Homework assignments

Homework assignments will provide you with an opportunity to try out some of the topics we have discussed in class. English Education students will write a statement (to be inserted in their CULPA) about using grammar and usage/punctuation in their future classrooms.

Reading assignments

You will be assigned readings that are to be completed before class. If I am concerned that students are not reading, I reserve the right to give reading quizzes, which will be graded.

Attendance and participation

Much of your learning will take place in our class, so you should attend on a regular basis. What, exactly, does this mean in the age of Covid? For ENGL 345, "attendance" means being in class **when it is possible for you to do so**. As we know, these are unprecedented times. We're trying to hold a "normal" class while a pandemic has changed our lives in many ways. I will take attendance in every class, but I ask that you not attend if you are ill.

You will have two (2) "freebie" absences for the semester. Use them carefully. If you miss more than two scheduled classes, each missed class will result in the loss of *ten points* from your attendance total (see Grading below). **Note that using a "freebie" does not excuse you from any due dates, in-class, or homework assignments.** Check with your classmates regarding any work you may have missed. See the Late Work policy below.

If you are ill (with Covid or any other illness), please contact me as soon as possible so we can make alternate arrangements for that period. It must be your responsibility to update me about any situation that causes you to miss class. Illness and other similar circumstances (family emergency, etc.) will be excused and will not count against the absence total.

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UNIVERSITY POLICIES

Student academic disciplinary procedures:

UWSP 14.01 Statement of principles

The Board of Regents, administrators, faculty, academic staff, and students of the University of Wisconsin System believe that academic honesty and integrity are fundamental to the mission of higher education and of the University of Wisconsin System. The university has a responsibility to promote academic honesty and integrity and to develop procedures to deal effectively with instances of academic dishonesty. UWSP 14.03 Academic misconduct subject to disciplinary action.

- (1) Academic misconduct is an act in which a student:

 - (b) Uses unauthorized materials or fabricated data in any academic exercise;
 - (c) Forges or falsifies academic documents or records;
 - (d) Intentionally impedes or damages the academic work of others;

- (2) Examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to: cheating on an examination; collaborating with others in work to be presented, contrary to the stated rules of the course; submitting a paper or assignment as one's own work when a part or all of the paper or assignment is the work of another; submitting a paper or assignment that contains ideas or research of others without appropriately identifying the sources of those ideas; stealing examinations or course materials; submitting, if contrary to the rules of a course, work previously presented in another course; tampering with the laboratory experiment or computer program of another student; knowingly and intentionally assisting another student in any of the above, including assistance in an arrangement whereby any work, classroom performance, examination or other activity is submitted or performed by a person other than the student under whose name the work is submitted or performed.

Commitment to integrity:

As a student in this course (and at this university) you are expected to maintain high degrees of professionalism, commitment to active learning and participation in this class and also integrity in your behavior in and out of the classroom.

FERPA:
