Fall 2016 FYS 101, Section 1 The Band That Changed the World

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Course Description:

When Apple Computer negotiated the rights to sell Beatles songs on Itunes in 2010, television advertising was simple: "The Beatles: The Band that Changed the World." The story of how four lads from Liverpool, England ushered in a revolution in music, popular culture, social and religious values, business practice and changed history is the topic of this Freshman Year Seminar. Students will explore the phenomenon of The Beatles in Great Britain and the "British Invasion" which transformed U.S. social and cultural norms for young people. The class will explore Beatlemania through a variety of materials from the history, art, film, eastern religious studies, business practices and political engagement, and, of course, music, in order to fully understand how the Beatles were more than the greatest rock band ever, but one which truly "changed the world."

- Describe the key components and purpose of a liberal education and explain how a liberal education will shape your college studies, career, and life.
- Identify key components of critical thinking and information literacy and apply the associated skills within course assignments.
- Identify and apply appropriate skills for college success, as well as appropriate UW-Stevens Point programs, resources, and services designed to support your academic studies
- Develop an education al plan that demonstrates the responsibility you will take for your own education, including curricular and co-curricular experiences.

Appreciate how the study of a rock'n'roll band adds to one's broad base of knowledge and liberal education as a university student.

How are grades determined?

These are the criteria I will use for assigning grades. They correlate closely with a 4.0 scale which will be reflected on the rubrics to evaluate individual assignments, though not perfectly. For example, a 4.0 is an A or 95; a 3.75 is an A- or 90%. If the average on the rubric is, let's say, a 3.88, then a 93% would be recorded in the D2L gradebook.
