How are grades determined?

These are the criteria I will use for assigning grades. They correlate closely with a 4.0 scale used on the rubrics to evaluate individual assignments, though not perfectly. Document Analysis: Documents will be selected from the collection edited by Toibin and Ferriter. More details to come.

You are required to write a 1000-1500 word analysis of the films' historical content, historical accuracy, and usefulness as a tool in illuminating the historical trends or events it depicts.

No paper will be accepted after the deadline listed in the syllabus, UNLESS I have given you prior written approval to turn the take home exam, paper or film analysis in at another time. There will be no exceptions!
