This course explores America's international interactions from the colonial period to World War I. We will analyze the role of the United States in the world, its wars, its territorial expansion, and its overseas commitments. Students will consider how early American policies set the stage for U.S. foreign policy today.

Exams:

The exams will consist of short-answer identifications of important terms, events, and people in the history of U.S. foreign relations. Students must provide definitions, dates, and significances. Study guides will be handed out in advance. Make-up exams will be administered only to those students who have made previous arrangements.

Papers:

Forgotten Allies Paper: Students will answer one of two questions handed out a week in advance. The paper should be five pages long, typed, and double-spaced. It is due by 2 PM on Monday, October 5, at 471 CCC.

Manifest Destiny Paper: Students will analyze the influence of ideas about manifest destiny on the foreign policy of Woodrow Wilson. The paper should be five pages long, typed, and double-spaced. It is due by 2:00 PM on Wednesday, November 18.

The Great War Project:

Students working in groups will research and present to the class on the debate over U.S. foreign policy regarding the Great War. For background, read pages 270-287 in the textbook. The 15-minute presentation will draw on primary and secondary sources. Ten percent of the grade will be on the presentation. Ten percent of the grade will be on the 2-3 page paper each student will write on his or her own primary and secondary source research which contributed to the group presentation. This paper is due at 2:00 PM on Wednesday, December 9.

Students may earn participation points in a number of ways. Any points that a student earns beyond 20 will count as extra credit toward the course grade.
