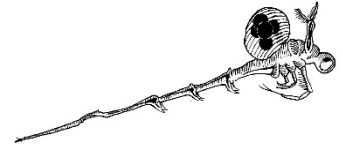

Description: Biotic and abiotic factors influencing invasions of native and exotic species including social, political, and economic concerns.

Learning outcomes: After completing this course, students will be able to describe the spread, impacts, evolution, and control of non-native species.

Required Course Materials: Via textbook rental - "Invasion Ecology" 2nd ed. by Lockwood, Hoopes, and Marchetti.

Grading: Exam 1 (100 pts), Exam 2 (100 pts), Exam 3 (final exam, 100 pts), and presentation (50 pts).

FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) provides students with a right to protect, review, and correct their student records. Staff of the university with a clear *educational need to know* may also have to access to certain student records. Exceptions to the law include parental notification in cases of alcohol or drug use, and in case of a health or safety concern. FERPA also permits a school to disclose personally identifiable information from a student's education records, without consent, to another school in which the student seeks or intends to enroll.

Academic Integrity
