Course Goals and Policies

Course Objectives

To establish a solid foundation in the fundamentals of the Russian Language through the development of speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills and to foster interest in the language and culture of Russia.

- Talk about books, authors, genres

- Talk about holidays, celebrations, and traditions
- Make and respond to invitations
- Making toasts
- Meeting and greeting hosts and guests

Course Policies

Test and Quizzes: There will be no make up quizzes, dictations or tests. If you miss a quiz, dictation, test or exam without a valid excuse (illness, family emergency), you will receive a zero for this test. *It is your responsibility to inform the instructor of your absence BEFORE the scheduled test.*

The Final Examination will be one hour in length and will consist of the same kinds of activities and tasks represented on the lesson tests. The final exam for this course will be held on May 4, from 9:55 p.m. – 10:50 p.m. to accommodate schedules for all three campuses.

55 minute Tests (one class period) will normally be given after every lesson. All tests will be comprehensive, that is, each one will cover material from previous lessons. More detailed information will be provided in advance of each lesson test.

Attendance: Since proficiency is acquired only through regular and active contact with the target language, you are expected to attend class on a daily basis. I will take attendance daily.

Homework Expectations: You can expect to spend approximately 1-2 hours of time on homework for every hour in class. This course entails regular work with **Listening Comprehension Audio Program to accompany Golosa Textbook.**

Homework is due at the beginning of each class. No late homework will be accepted without a legitimate excuse (e.g., illness). If you know that you will have to miss class on a particular date, submit your homework assignment in advance and you will still receive the homework points for that day.

Policy on Incomplete Grades:

Incomplete grades are awarded only because of illness or other unusual circumstances BEYOND THE STUDENT'S CONTROL. The student must submit official evidence and discuss the situation with the instructor.
