

## SOC 230: CRIMINOLOGY

## Social Science GEP Learning Outcomes

- 1. Social Science GEP Learning Outcomes: This course meets the GEP Investigation level Social Science requirement. The social science learning outcomes are:
- 2. Define the major concepts and methods used by social scientists to investigate, analyze, or to predict human or group behavior.
- 3. Explain the major principles, models, and issues under investigation by the social sciences.
- 4. Examine how the individual or groups of individuals are influenced by social, cultural, or political institutions both in their own culture and in other cultures.



### **Course Description**

The primary objective of this course is to provide students with a general understanding of the field of criminology. This class is a sociology class, which focuses on crime and criminal behavior. The main focus of this class will be the examination of criminological theories of crime and criminal behavior. We also will examine criminological research, the history of criminology as a discipline; and the nature, extent, and patterns of crime and criminal behavior. This is not a law, corrections, or policing course; and while we may cover some topics related to these areas, it is first and foremost a theory course.

## **Course Expectations**

This is a blended class- which means that some of the class will require students to complete class work online instead of in the classroom. This includes, but is not limited to, videos, assignments, discussions, and exams. All out of class activities and assignments will be submitted on <a href="Canvas">Canvas</a>. I will not accept any assignments completed outside of class in any other form (no paper or e-mail submissions). Approximately one-fourth of the course is online (eight classes) while three-fourths occurs face-to-face.

A large portion of this class will be devoted to discussion and group activities. Students are expected to have completed the assigned readings prior to coming to class (see schedule of readings attached and on Canvas). Students are expected to contribute their viewpoints and opinions during class discussions. Due to the active role students play in this course, regular attendance is strongly encouraged. While attendance may not be checked daily, excessive absence will negatively affect your final grade. Students are responsible for all information and assignments missed during their absences--including announcements concerning any changes in the course schedule.

#### **Student Engagement Expected**

Attend Class: Due to the active role students play in this course, regular attendance is strongly encouraged. While attendance may not be checked daily, excessive absences will negatively affect your final grade. There will be random attendance days where points will be given. Students not in class will not receive these points. Students are responsible for all information and assignments missed during their absences—including announcements concerning any changes in the course schedule.



Complete Assigned Reading: Students are expected to have completed the assigned readings prior to coming to class (see <u>Canvas</u> for schedule of readings). Come to class prepared to ask questions and to discuss the readings of the day.

**Participate**: Student engagement is directly linked to success in the classroom, and when you are engaged in the classroom, you become a full participant in what you're learning. A large portion of this class will be devoted to discussion and group activity. Students are expected to contribute their viewpoints and opinions during class discussion. There will be 10 points for student participation.

Optional Reading in the Disciplines Section: To help you succeed in this course, you may choose to enroll in an optional one-credit, pass-fail Reading in the Disciplines (RID) section. This section will meet once a week with a student facilitator to discuss the readings for Sociology 230. You may register for one of these courses via AccesSPoint. The discussion courses meet: Mondays at 5:00pm (course number: 83098) or Thursdays at 2:00pm (course number: 83099) starting Week 3. ### Class Assignments and Expectations

Quizzes (100 -150 points) Up to four unannounced in-class quizzes may be given in class. Students not in class on these days will not receive these points. Except for documented emergencies, No Make Up in-class quizzes will be given. Also, there will be several online quizzes through <u>Canvas</u>.

Exams (300 points) Three exams will be given during the semester plus a comprehensive final exam. The exams will cover information from class lectures, audio-visual materials, and the readings indicated on the course schedule. You are responsible for all readings even if they are not discussed specifically in class. Dates for exams are on the course schedule. Any changes in exam dates will be announced in class. Each of these exams is worth 100 points. Students have the option of either dropping the lowest exam score or not taking the final. Exam format will be discussed during class. Except for documented emergencies, No Makeup exams will be given. If a student misses an exam, they should consider it their dropped score.

Individual Participation: (10 points) Student's should come to class prepared to contribute to the conversation. Students should make thoughtful contributions based on the literature, class readings, personal experience or prior knowledge that advances the conversation without dominating it. Students should also show an interest in and respect for others' contributions. Each student is expected to contribute individually to the class and they will be given 2 points each class they participate in, up to 5 times in the semester. By the end of the semester 10 points possible. The following things are considered class participation: asking questions, offering an example, sharing class related announcements or extra credit options

There will be a contribution sheet for students to sign each day they have contributed. If a student forgets to sign the contribution sheet they will not get the points for that day. Students may not sign the contribution sheet before the end of class and they will not get points on days they leave class early.

Collaborative Contribution: (50-150 points) There will be several individual and group in-class assignments given from peer editing to small group or individual presentations or discussions. These assignments will be completed in class Students, not in class on these days will not receive these points.

**Blended Class Expectations & Essays** (50 -100 points) Each blended class will require students to complete work online instead of in the classroom. The class schedule will list all blended classes.
