Description

The power of religion to encourage violence and create conflict is well-known. The power of religion to create peace and harmony is also well-known. Each of these statements represents how much of the world views "religion." In this course we will explore some of the specific reasons that religions have the ability to both encourage violence and create peace.

Learning Outcomes:

This course offers you the tools necessary to achieve the following outcomes:

Attendance

Regular attendance is expected.
