Course Goals and SLOs:

Spanish 102 is the second semester of language study in the sequence of Spanish at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. The purpose of the course is to continue working with vocabulary and grammar in the context of current situations found in Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States. Also, there are readings with short compositions in Spanish on current cultural and personal themes. Every chapter will contain specific activities working on your reading, writing, listening, speaking, and cultural comprehension. Please see the specific chapter goals below:

Course-level SLOs (Student Learning Objectives)

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Define Spanish vocabulary used in the context of current situations found in Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States.
2. Use correct Spanish vocabulary when writing and speaking Spanish in the context of current situations found in Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States.
3. Identify correct Spanish grammar used in the context of current situations found in Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States.
4. Use correct Spanish grammar when writing and speaking Spanish in the context of current situations found in Spanish speaking countries including regions of the United States.
5. Identify how different current cultural and/or personal situations, both formal and informal, affect Spanish grammar and vocabulary.
6. Apply (use) correct Spanish grammar and vocabulary based on current cultural and/or personal situations.
7. Explain the influence that ancient (indigenous, older, ancient, pre-conquest) Hispanic-American and Peninsular-Spain Spanish speaking cultures have had on the current language.

Expectations:

- 1. Preparation and Participation:** You will be assigned daily sections to study or activities to complete in the eTextbook. The activities to be completed are for practice. They **will be graded based on completion**. It is your responsibility to ensure that you are doing them correctly and understanding the material.
- 2. Homework:** You will be assigned daily sections to complete in the electronic Student Activities Manual (eSAM). These activities **will** be graded and this will comprise your grade for "Homework".
- 3. Quizzes:** There will be **six quizzes**, one for each chapter, and assigned in the eTextbook. All chapter quizzes will be assigned on the Friday of that chapter. You will have access to the quiz from 6 PM Friday to 6 PM Saturday; you can take the quiz anytime during this 24 hour period. However, once you start, you will have only 90 minutes to finish the quiz; you will not be able to stop the timer once you start and you cannot leave the test page. In addition, you will be able to submit your answers only once.

IMPORTANT: All assigned activities, graded or not, **OTHER THAN chapter quizzes** will need to be done by 9:00 AM on the following class day that they were assigned.

Example 1: On Day 1 (Monday) you will be assigned "Vocabulario" to study along with corresponding ungraded but need to be completed eTextbook vocabulary activities for practice. In addition, you will be assigned graded electronic Student Activities Manual (eSAM) vocabulary exercises. All of these activities (eTextbook and eSAM) are due by 9:00 AM on Day 2 (Tuesday).

Example 2: On Day 5 (Friday) you will be assigned the chapter 7 quiz, which will be available at 6:00 PM on Friday, and it will be due by 6:00 PM on Saturday.

- 4. Weekly Discussions:** There will be **six weekly discussion**, one for each chapter. The instructions for each discussion are under the **Discussion Instructions** for every week. Please keep in mind Netiquette. These **Netiquette Guidelines** are located in the **Begin Here** module.
- 5. Final Interview:** There will be one **final interview** at the end on the course. This will consist of an online simultaneous chat between the instructor and the student. The purpose of this interview is a review of what the student has learned throughout the course. Further instructions of what will be covered during the interview will be given to the students during the last week of the course.
