COURSE DESCRIPTION

Spanish 315: Developing Reading Proficiency will train students to progress in reading in the target language (L2) from an intermediate Mid to Advanced Low levels of competency. We'll explore different reading strategies and types of texts such as newspaper articles, academic papers, graphic novels, non-fiction and poetry. As with other WLL courses, Spanish 315 is built to practice the four skills of language learning: Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing. The common link among all reading materials will be memory. We'll read texts that deal with the memory of loved ones, the loss of memory, the persistence of memory, autobiography, historical memory, political memory, as well as personal and collective trauma. In this regard, we'll explore historical and political memories of Spain, Mexico, Colombia, Argentina and Chile. The required readings are from Spain (Paco Roca's Arrugas) and from Colombia (Piedad Bonnett's Lo que no tiene nombre).

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

-In-class students' presentation: "Los objetos de mi memoria" (8 points)

We'll start the course with students choosing a particular object of them (picture[s], toys, items of clothing, etc.) and talking about how it helps them remember a particular time of their past. In Spanish, of course.

-11 Reading Quizzes (2 points each, 22 points in total)

In CANVAS. After every reading you'll have to answer two questions on them. These questions (and your answers) will be used to spark in-class discussions.

-In-class presentation: Newspaper/Magazine article (10 points)

(Almost) Every Friday, two students will be selected to do an in-class presentation on a Spanish language newspaper/magazine article of their choosing. 15 to 20 minutes

-Take-Home Exam to choose between Arrugas or Lo que no tiene nombre (40 points)

Every take-home exam will consist of 6 essay-long questions. You will pick 4 of them.

One page minimum for each question (Times New Roman, 12 points, 1.5 line separation)
so 4 pages minimum in total.

-Group Presentation (20 points)

Every group (which I will create randomly when the time comes) will present 1 historical episode and 1 cultural production from 1 Spanish-speaking country.
