LAS METAS DEL CURSO:

Hay tres metas principales de Español 345:

1. El repaso y el mejorar de las habilidades de escuchar, hablar, leer y escribir español.
2. El repaso de la gramática española y el aumentar del vocabulario.
3. La continuación de aprender más de los asuntos actuales que enfrentan las culturas del habla español.

LOS REQUISITOS DEL CURSO:

1. Asistencia y participación: Se espera que el estudiante no falte a clase. Si por circunstancias excepcionales no se puede asistir a la clase, es la responsabilidad del estudiante enterarse de la tarea para la próxima clase (en Canvas) y prepararse para la próxima clase. **No me envíe un mensaje por correo electrónico para explicar la ausencia.** Las ausencias, por cualquier razón, resultarán en la pérdida de puntos. La participación activa en clase constituye una parte importante de la nota final. Es necesario que usted prepare de antemano la tarea asignada para esa fecha, y que tenga completada la tarea para ese día particular.

En clase hay que observar las siguientes reglas:

- a. Llegar a tiempo.
- b. Estar listo(a) para participar activamente en clase. No es suficiente simplemente estar presente sin contribuir a la conversación en clase.
- c. Encender la cámara (turn-on your cámara) a menos que haya una circunstancia inesperada/problemática e excepcional que no le permite encenderla (unless there is a specific, exceptional reason why you cannot during that class period.)
- d. Participar y no salir durante las conversaciones con otros por medio de “break-out rooms”

Se recibirá una nota de participación cada semana basada en la escala siguiente:

Ausencia o falta completa de preparación y/o participación = 0 puntos

Participación y preparación mínima = 1 punto

Participación y preparación adecuada = 2 puntos

Preparación excelente y participación activa y voluntaria = 3 puntos

2. La preparación de la tarea. Habrá tarea diaria para preparar y entregar por medio de Canvas antes de la clase.
3. Usted entregará **dos composiciones** a lo largo del semestre. Las composiciones se entregará en Canvas. Recibirá el tema del trabajo antes de la fecha límite de la composición (véase el calendario de clase). Habrá cinco composiciones a lo largo del semestre. Usted tendrá que escoger dos temas de las cinco opciones para hacer. Cada trabajo va a tratar de un tema literario o cultural estudiado durante el curso. Consistirá en aproximadamente 500 palabras-, escrito por computadora, a renglón abierto, con márgenes de una pulgada, con título y del tipo Times New Roman de 12 puntos. Después de entregar la composición usted va a recibirla con sugerencias para mejorarla. Tendrá la oportunidad de revisarla poniendo las correcciones en la composición; ¡no quiero que escriba de nuevo la composición! Recibirá una nota para la primera versión y para la revisión; su nota final será el promedio de estas dos.
4. Ustedes van a presentar **tres breves presentaciones orales**. Si Ud. no está en clase el día de recibir el tema y, en caso de trabajar en parejas, el nombre del compañero, es su responsabilidad de preparar una interacción individual fuera de clase. (If you miss virtual class on the day that presentations are assigned and, in some cases, partners, then you will have to prepare an individual presentation). La intención de las presentaciones orales en pareja es mejorar las habilidades de conversar con otros estudiantes; por eso, será más difícil recibir una buena nota con una interacción individual. Si Ud. u otro miembro de su grupo no está en clase el día de la presentación, se van a presentar Uds. el próximo día. Por esta inconsideración del individuo ausente, él va a recibir una nota más baja, por una letra.
5. Habrá un **examen midterm**.
6. Habrá un **examen final** que consistirá en una última presentación oral y una breve parte escrita.

Student Academic Disciplinary Procedures

UWSP 14.01 Statement of principles

The board of regents, administrators, faculty, academic staff and students of the university of Wisconsin system believe that academic honesty and integrity are fundamental to the mission of higher education and of the university of Wisconsin system. The university has a responsibility to promote academic honesty and integrity and to develop procedures to deal effectively with instances of academic dishonesty. Students are responsible for the honest completion and representation of their work, for the appropriate citation of sources, and for respect of others' academic endeavors. Students who violate these standards must be confronted and must accept the consequences of their actions.

UWSP 14.03 Academic misconduct subject to disciplinary action.

(1) Academic misconduct is an act in which a student:

- (a) Seeks to claim credit for the work or efforts of another without authorization or citation;
- (b) Uses unauthorized materials or fabricated data in any academic exercise;
- (c) Forges or falsifies academic documents or records;
- (d) Intentionally impedes or damages the academic work of others;
- (e) Engages in conduct aimed at making false representation of a student's academic performance; or
- (f) Assists other students in any of these acts.

(2) Examples of academic misconduct include, but are not limited to: cheating on an examination; collaborating with others in work to be presented, contrary to the stated rules of the course; submitting a paper or assignment as one's own work when a part or all of the paper or assignment is the work of another; submitting a paper or assignment that contains ideas or research of others without appropriately identifying the sources of those ideas; stealing examinations or course materials; submitting, if contrary to the rules of a course, work previously presented in another course; tampering with the laboratory experiment or computer program of another student; knowingly and intentionally assisting another student in any of the above, including assistance in an arrangement whereby any work, classroom performance, examination or other activity is submitted or performed by a person other than the student under whose name the work is submitted or performed.
