

## **Class Description**

Analysis of crime as an institution, with reference to behavior of those who define, engage in, or become the victims of criminal behavior.

## Course Learning Outcomes

## Class Assignments

Canvas Quiz/Syllabus Quiz (25 points): There is a short Canvas orientation and syllabus quiz assigned week one.

Chapter Quizzes (100 points) There are nine short quizzes (true false/multiple) over each chapter from your textbook. Your top four-chapter quizzes count towards your final grade. All quizzes are due the Monday after the material is covered.

Discussions (75 points): There are three required discussions assigned throughout the semester.

Exams (200 points) There are two exams given in this class, a midterm exam and a final exam. Each of these exams covers information from the previous weeks and is worth 100 points.

Essays (100 points): There are six essay options given throughout the semester. Student are required to complete two of these essays. It is recommended that students complete one essay before midterm.

Grades: Letter grades will be assigned based on the percentage of the possible points that are earned. The point system may be revised. Bring your syllabus and reading schedule to class so you can note any changes.
