



1. What are independent reasons?

Two or more ideas or groups of ideas are independent reasons in support of a conclusion if each idea or group of ideas is capable of supporting the conclusion on its own.

The first blank should contain an inference eraser expression, and because there is no contrast between the two ideas being connected, I'd use an inference eraser from the "And" family (e.g. "and," "moreover," "furthermore," "in addition").

The second blank should contain a reason indicator expression (e.g. "because" "since" "given that" "assuming that" "inasmuch as" "in view of the fact that" "the reason is that" "after all").

The third blank should contain a theme changer expression (e.g. "Besides," "Furthermore," "In addition to this," "As if that weren't enough," "Finally").

The fourth blank should contain an inference eraser expression, and because there is no contrast between the two ideas being connected, I'd use an inference eraser from the "And" family (e.g. "and," "moreover," "furthermore," "in addition")

The fifth blank should contain a conclusion indicator expression (e.g. "therefore" "thus" "consequently" "hence" "so" "this goes to show that" "it follows that" "as a result" "that's why" "which implies that" "which means that").
