Important Notes

Open Enrollment

There are two elements to our open enrollment. It needs to be emphasized, however, that these changes are for CURRENTLY **REGISTERED MEMBERS**, not for non-members.

The first element of open enrollment is the elimination of wait lists. Except for classes and field trips that have expressed limits, all registrations for classes will be unlimited. The rationale for this is that we never have had too few seats for classes, even those that have had high enrollments.
