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COURSE DESCRIPTION

We are likely familiar with many claims about when government regulation gets in the way of efficiency. Likewise, you may also be familiar with problems markets aren't able to remedy. Public goods and common pool resources are unique in that neither governments nor markets remedy them effectively. This semester, we will not only learn about the theoretical study of political institutions but we will also conduct a class project studying how public goods operate in the real world. Our class research will ask "how can public goods or common pool resources be democratically governed?" To answer this, we will study the historical interaction of public and private goods in the Stevens Point area. Students will work in teams to produce analyses of socio-economic data, measure the interests of constituents, and public policies that have generated present conditions.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Students will ...

- demonstrate comprehension of concepts fundamental to the study of politics.
- employ interpretive skills to construct research questions.
- analyze data as evidence in conducting research.
- contextualize quantitative data using qualitative information.
