Content / Purpose

This class is a continuation of Basic Sculpture. A series of slide lectures, video screenings and field trips (listening, seeing and thinking) will expose you to a diverse sampling of historical and contemporary work in sculpture. You will explore a variety of new materials and techniques. Wood carving and fabrication, modeling, installation, casting and welding are the main focus of the class. Class time will be split between group critiques material demonstrations and work on your projects. I am hoping to create a supportive but critical context in which we can discuss the many dialogues you have set up between yourself, your colleagues and what you create. During this class you will be working in-groups for some assignments.

Requirements:

1. Attend class. Three absences mean a lower letter grade.
2. Get to class on time. Three tardiness=an absence
3. Participate in class discussion. This is a **MUST**
4. For this class you are expected to produce 3 works to be critiqued on "critique days. A period of approximately 6 weeks will be devoted to the first 2 projects. The last 3 weeks will be devoted for the last project. All work should be finished for scheduled critics' times. I would like to see you developing a thinking process that would help you understand sculpture. So, communication is important! I have office hours and e-mail. Let's communicate!!!!!!
5. All sculpture (objects/pieces) must be brought to the sculpture area for critique. Only on campus installation will be critiqued. No Exceptions.
6. Three finished drawings on 22" x 30" rag paper (Rives BFK, Arche, Fabriano)
7. Presentation on an artist of your choice that inspires/informs your work.

This research will also be presented (to the instructor) in written form (3-5 pages type written).

8. We will start the clean up at 9:30 Start and finish by 9:50. Clean up is part of participation.
9. I will announce the day for the FINAL CLEAN UP. **It is mandatory that you attend the event.**

Attendance and Class Participation

Materials and Shop Use

The art department provides certain expendable tools, general supplies and construction materials. A \$200 materials fee is charged to each enrolled student to help cover these costs. Pays for foundry and woodshop equipment and maintenance, welding rods, wood, Gas (Oxygen, Argon, etc) Wax, plaster, Steel, Sand, ceramic shall, etc. **Bronze doesn't include**

In that case you are responsible for making these purchases yourself that might account for an additional \$100+ of expenses. **Hardbound sketchbook of your favorite size must be brought to every class!** Favorite drawing pencils, pens, etc.
