Course Description

Introduction to web design principles, development process and tools for developing websites and applications.

Course Objectives

- Gain an understanding of the history and present state of Web design, and the current technologies used to create and view content on the Web;
- Demonstrate competency in hand-coding HTML5, CSS3 and JavaScript for crossbrowser and cross-platform environments;
- Demonstrate competency with Web creation tools like Dreamweaver;
- Demonstrate competency creating, optimizing and publishing images for the Web;
- Demonstrate basic understanding of project management for the Web.

- You will be working in groups for these projects. The make-up of the group will be
 determined at random, and the size determined by whatever number divides evenly (if
 possible.) If you would like to request a change of group for any reason, you must notify
 me within two weeks of the groups being assigned. The groups will be re-randomized
 for each project. The Mid-Term and Final Projects will have the following deliverables.

They can be turned in at any time up to the due date and should be zipped into an archive and submitted to the relevant Dropbox in D2L:

- Research and Planning Your submission to this Dropbox should include the basic deliverables expected in the initial phases of development. This includes, at a minimum:
 - A statement of work or creative brief that includes a project summary,
 scope definition (including deliverables), schedule, and key assumptions.
 - A content outline or site flow map
- Website Design Your submission to this Dropbox should include the deliverables expected in the middle design phases of development. This includes, at a minimum:
 - A wireframe or mock up site.
 - A graphic mockup/comp.
- Website Development The submission of your completed project, which will be a development site / prototype that would be hosted on a development server and tested until it goes live.

Exams

- Both tests and final exam are closed-book and closed-notes.
- Final exam is comprehensive.
- In general, any test or exam can NOT be made up.
- If you miss a test or exam due to unavoidable circumstances (e.g., health), you must inform the instructor and a written explanation along with the supporting documents must be submitted to the instructor.
