# **Social Aspects of Substance Abuse**

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#### **Course Overview**

The purpose of this course is to examine several aspects of drug use from a sociological perspective. Particular attention is paid to the social aspects of drug use, including the social construction of use, abuse, and dependence, as well as the micro- and macro-level social effects of illegal drug use. This perspective is broader than a psychological view of drug use in that the focus is on factors beyond the individual user.

### **Course Objectives**

The broad objectives of the course are to:

- Apply the sociological imagination to an understanding of drug use
- Examine the social history of drug use in the U.S.
- Delineate the different types and classes of drugs, their correlates, and consequences
- Examine the societal response to drug use

#### **Class Attendance**

## Exams

There are two exams in this class. **The final will not be cumulative.** They will be a mix of short answer and multiple choice with approximately 35 questions each and will cover material from your text, from lectures, and from in- and out-class exercises. Each exam is worth **20%** of your final grade. Please look carefully at the course schedule for the dates of each exam.

# <u>There will be no make-up exams without documentation of legitimate emergency reasons for</u> <u>missing exam dates.</u>

## Assignments

There will be about **2** assignments for which you will USE the material we cover in class. Collectively, the assignment are worth **45%** of your final grade. First, there will be a <u>report on a</u> <u>biographical book</u> about the experience of a user of the drug of your choosing. This assignment is worth **20%**. Second, there will be <u>final paper</u> on your choice of 3 or 4 topics. The paper is worth **25%**.
